COASTAL CLEANUP EDUCATION DAY

SEPTEMBER 12, 2018

425 2nd through 5th grade students from the greater L.A. region ventured to our Santa Monica Pier Aquarium for a day of education and fun at our 14th annual Coastal Cleanup Education Day. With the amazing support from the CA Coastal Conservancy & the City of Santa Monica, students participated in hands-on activities to learn about the ocean, marine life, and ocean pollution. Kids rotated through four stations led by dedicated Heal the Bay staff and volunteers, along with our Key to the Sea partners Roundhouse Aquarium, The SEA Lab, and USC Sea Grant.

Through this educational field trip, we hope to foster the future generation of ocean stewards. For some students, this was their first time visiting the beach, and we helped inspire them to take care of what they love!



Beach Exploration:

Students dug in the sand and looked for animals beneath their feet, while learning how important the beach is to the ocean ecosystem and how we depend on it in our daily lives. Exploring kelp and sand crabs students learned about marine animals and their natural habitat.



Santa Monica Pier Aquarium:

Students got “up close and personal” with local animals found in the Santa Monica Bay—an opportunity to meet and respect our local critters, encouraging future stewards for our ocean environment.



Marine Debris Cleanup:

After interacting with aquarium animals and learning the threats organisms face from pollution, students participated in their own cleanup for a chance to make a difference! Hard at work, they collected nearly 1,600 cigarette butts—yuck!



Fatal Food Relay:

In this race, students' fate lies in the hands of the unmarked bags they are racing after. Each bag contains either seafood or “fatal food.” This relay shows how easily and unknowingly animals mistake trash for food.

HEALTHY NEIGHBORHOODS...

The key to preventing ocean pollution starts with healthy neighborhoods. Heal the Bay & partners hosted 29 inland sites to engage communities in cleaning up their local neighborhoods. Avalon Gardens, Compton Creek, Balboa Lake, and Arroyo Seco had over 2,412 volunteers combined, and participants collected over 42,260 lbs of trash. By removing trash from these inland sites, we improve the health of the neighborhoods and keep it out of our waterways and storm drain system. Win, win.
